2001 "Forever Plaid" Tour to Korea

"Four Boys sang in front of 3,000 girls!"

"The Korea tour was a life changing experience. It really opened my eyes to the different cultures of our world. It was an experience that I will be able to pass on to my children and share with my family for the rest of my life."

On May 13-26, 2001, six Mansfield University music students and Dr. Youngsuck Kim left for a place they never thought they would visit. When we were informed that we were going to be venturing to Korea, we became incredibly excited. We did everything we could to raise funds and gain support in the Mansfield community and on campus. We were very fortunate to have experienced the Korean culture and perform in front of such responsive audiences. We performed "Forever Plaid" at five different universities as well as a Korean Airline Hotel. The cities we visited included Incheon, Kwangju, Kyungju, Pusan, Seoul and Cheju Island.

Perhaps the biggest highlight was our performance at Ewha Womans University, where we stayed for one week. We were invited to do the show in commemoration of the university's 115th anniversary. We performed for an audience of over 3,000 people, on the same stage as Pavarotti, Maria Callas, and other great musicians. It was quite a rush to hear the unison clapping of such an appreciative crowd. It felt like being in the Metropolitan Opera House after a thrilling performance. The crews that worked with us at our venues were incredible. Even though language was a barrier, we were still able to complete everything needed to put on a successful show at each venue. The stage was beautiful and the acoustics were perfect. Each performance turned out to be a huge success.

We stopped in Alaska, another place we never thought we would go. Upon arriving in Korea we traveled the countryside full of rice fields and landscape that looked very similar to what we have here in Mansfield. While in the country we had an opportunity to visit one of the oldest Buddhist temples in Korea, as well as ancient tombs of Korean kings, beautiful countryside, and natural springs. We had the chance to visit a natural hot spring one morning during our stay. As we bathed in some of the freshest water and sat in therapeutic saunas, Dr. Kim explained the importance of nature and health in Korean

culture. For instance, we learned that jade holds significant meaning in Korea. Koreans believe that the stone balances natural chemicals and energy in the body. In fact, one sauna was made completely of jade. In Pusan, after a very successful performance, we ventured home with our host students and spent one night with their families. It was very hard for us because each family spoke about five words in English and we struggled to communicate. We quickly learned that we had to be more inventive in how we expressed what we needed to say. We made lifelong friends with whom we all correspond with frequently, and hope to see again soon.

From Incheon to Seoul to Cheju Island, we tried various Korean delicacies like octopus, eel and dried squid; and drinks like Soju, Hite, and traditional Korean rice wine. The Plaids saw paradise in Cheju Island: palm trees, beaches, volcanoes, and the Pacific Ocean. We swam in the Pacific, waded in the low tide, and experienced the best accommodations available on the island at the Cheju Shilla Hotel. The resort far surpassed any other place that any of us had visited before. We felt completely relaxed and at home there.

Another highlight of the trip was our final meal in Korea. The cast and crew of "Forever Plaid" had the distinct honor to have lunch with Sung-June Cho, Dr. Kim's brother-in-law. Mr. Cho is a highly respected individual in the Korean Congress. He invited us to eat with him on the 59th floor of the 63 Building in Seoul, the tallest building in the city. You can just imagine how good the food was considering where the restaurant was located. But the food was not the best part about the meal; we got a chance to discuss Korean culture and tradition with one of Korea's most intelligent leaders. Our conversations ranged from different foods to the importance of family in both American and Korean cultures. We also discussed how nature plays such an important role in the development of the human mind and spirit. The Korean people were very friendly and so willing to drop what they were doing just to offer us a helping hand. People arranged their schedules to give us rides to other cities, and countless others gave up so much to help our success and from the bottom of our "Heart and Soul," we thank them.

Overall, we have become more open minded about other cultures, but

Youngsuck Kim, Tenor, is associate professor of voice and director of opera workshop and the annual spring musical. Since joining the faculty in 1988, Dr. Kim has directed 15 productions. Dr. Kim has been an active performer appearing in a variety of operatic roles, over 30 major oratorios, and many recitals throughout North America, Asia, Korea, Canada, France and Czech Republic. Dr. Kim earned his Bachelor of Music degree from Seoul National University, a Master of Music Degree from the New England Conservatory of Music and a Doctor of Musical Arts Degree from the University of Miami. He has been listed in the premier edition of Who's Who Among Asian Americans by virtue of significant social, civic and professional contributions to American society. In May of 2001, Dr Kim led a 14-day performance tour to Korea of the production, "FOREVER PLAID."

Ensemble News

This will be another exciting year for the **choral ensembles**. The Mansfieldians will join with the MU Jazz Ensemble for an evening of vocal and instrumental jazz entitled "All the old familiar places." Each musical selection will refer to places, such as "I Left My Heart in San Francisco." The home concert will be October 12 in Steadman Theatre. It will be repeated at the Corning Museum of Glass on October 26. The theme for the annual holiday concerts is "A European Holiday" to be presented on November 30 and December 1. All of the repertoire and carols will have originated in various countries of Europe.

The Festival Chorus will perform "Carmina Burana" by Carl Orff with full orchestra on April 6 and 7. Professional soloists, Gayle Berman and Neil Wilson, will return to Mansfield for the performances. Plans are underway for a 16-day Concert Choir tour in May to Budapest, Vienna, Prague, Leipzig, and Berlin, some of the most spectacular regions and cities in Hungary, Austria, the Czech Republic, and Germany. The tour will include performances at some of the loveliest cathedrals in Europe and an International Choral Festival in Zwickau.

The Mansfield University Student Chapter of the American Choral Directors Association was awarded first prize as the Outstanding Student Chapter in the Nation at the recent ACDA National Convention in San Antonio, Texas. The selection is based upon their service to choral music, service to the university, and service to the chapter members. This marks the third time members of the Mansfield chapter have been recognized nationally for their hard work. John Dawe, junior liberal studies major, is the current President. Peggy Dettwiler is the chapter advisor.

The Mansfield University **Concert Wind Ensemble** has begun work on the commission entitled "Spark." By Carolyn Bremer. Bremer studied at the Eastman School of Music, CalArts, and received the Ph.D. in composition from the University of California, Santa Barbara. Her teachers include Edward Applebaum, Emma Lou Diemer, Buell Neidlinger, and Pulitzer Prize-winning composers Mel Powell and Joseph Schwantner. She has an exclusive contract with publisher Carl Fischer, Inc., who handles all of her musical works. From 1991-2000, Dr. Bremer chaired the music composition program at the University of Oklahoma. While there, she directed the New Century Ensembles and held the Sandra and Brian O'Brien Presidential Professorship in Music. Currently she is a freelance composer residing on the coast near Santa Barbara, California.

When asked why she chose the title, Dr. Bremer said, "Well, it came from looking up tradition, heritage, excellence, et al. I kept popping from synonym to synonym through a lot of different paths. I don't remember the precise path I took to get there. Spark is, I guess, what the MU music program does: put a spark in students' lives." The work is highly energetic and makes use of fragments of the MU Alma Mater. Typical of Dr. Bremer's style, the composition is very chamber music oriented, using full forces of the ensemble only near the end as it builds to its climax. The commission was made possible by donations from Mansfield University Chapter of Phi MU Alpha Sinfonia, Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma National Band fraternities, MU Bands and the MU Music Department. The ensemble plans to premiere this work while on tour this November. It will be performed in Mansfield on Sunday, November 18, at 3 p.m. in the final concert of the semester by MU Bands.

Dr. Bremer plans to visit the Mansfield University campus in April 2002. During her visit she will lecture to music classes, rehearse a number of her works with faculty and students, and have a concert of

her works performed. Her visit is being sponsored in part through an Impact Project Grant from Sigma Alpha Iota Philanthropies, Inc. and the Delta Phi Chapter of Sigma Alpha Iota at Mansfield University.

The 2001/02 school year promises to be a busy and eventful one for the MU **Jazz Ensemble**. First, we plan on hosting the first ever reunion concert of the MU Jazz Ensemble. Recognizing its history, this also is meant to include former members of the Esquires - the dance band from which the current MU Jazz Ensemble developed.

The concert will be on Sunday, March 24, 2002 at 3 p.m. in Steadman Theatre. Rehearsals will begin on Saturday beginning at 10 a.m. and continue throughout the day. We have planned this to coincide with the MU Jazz Festival, which will be held on Friday, March 22. It is hoped that participants will be able to arrive early and attend the festival concert on Friday evening at 7:30 p.m. No news yet on who the guest artists will be but it is the 20th anniversary of the festival and we are trying to line up something special. Recent guests have included Kenny Werner, Chris Potter, Tom Harrell, Randy Brecker, Bob Mintzer and the Airmen of Note. In addition to the festival concert on Friday there will be a banquet on Saturday evening with current members of the MU Jazz Ensemble. When applications are returned, I will send motel information as well as more specific details about rehearsals and the banquet.

Now, to update you on the current activities of the MU Jazz Ensemble. I just received notice that we have been invited to perform at the PMEA Conference in Philadelphia in April 2002! The band was chosen from over 130 taped entries. This is fantastic news and it especially nice to be able to follow up on last year's PMEA performances by both the Concert Choir and the Wind Ensemble. We will probably be performing on Friday evening, April 19 for "Jazz Night" but that is not yet confirmed.


The Jazz Ensemble and Mansfieldians will perform their annual concert twice this fall. First in Steadman on October 12 at 8 p.m. and again at the Corning Museum in Corning, NY on Friday evening, October 26 at 7:30 p.m. These concerts have proven to be among our most successful presentations. The program features combined tunes, individual selections by both groups, as well as vocal soloists backed by the big band. This year's theme is "All The Old Familiar Places" and the concert will feature tunes like St. Louis Blues, Tennessee Waltz, Spain, Chattanooga Choo Choo, A Nightingale Sang in Berkeley Square and other standards.

New Faculty Members

He also visited the Louvre, Orsay, and Picasso museums, marveling at the grandeur, quality and sheer quantity of art works. Dr. Crowder will give a lecture on Musical Theatre and the Young Voice at the November ACDA Conference at Mansfield.

Peggy Dettwiler, director of choral activities, and her husband, Jürgen Thym, traveled to southern Italy and Sicily in May. Highlights of the trip included Pompeii, Positano, and the Greek temples in

Segesta and Agrigento. She also located some wonderful future concert sites at St. Ignatius Cathedral in Rome and the Palatine Chapel in Palermo. Dr. Dettwiler became president of the American Choral Directors Association of Pennsylvania on July 1. To prepare for her term, she attended the ACDA National Leadership Retreat in Oklahoma City. Her first official duty was hosting the Summer Conference in State College, PA, in August. Closer to home, Dr. Dettwiler, produced the third compact disc of the Concert Choir. Watch for the release of "How can I keep from singing" this fall! She also developed the plans for the third Concert Choir European Tour next May.

Shellie Gregorich has been invited to present a paper at the 44th National College Music Society Conference this November in Sante Fe, New Mexico. Her presentation will focus on ways to incorporate student performance into the first-year music theory class. She will be featured in a session entitled "Perspectives in Teaching." Dr. Gregorich will present a recital with Dr. Kevin Hoferer, saxophone, on September 7. The recital will feature works by Giovanni Platti, Leslie Bassett, Jacques Charpentier, and Jindrich Feld.

Youngsuck Kim had a very productive summer. He led a 14-day tour of the Mansfield University musical, "Forever Plaid" in Korea (see article). Dr. Kim's next dream will be to plan tours in Japan and China. After the production of "Forever Plaid," he stayed two more weeks in Korea. He gave two master classes in Mokwon University and Dong A University. He also gave three recitals in Seoul, Daejun and Daeduk Science Concert Hall.

From July 1-17, he attended two vocal seminars at Milano, Italy and Marseille, France, led by Jean-Pierre Blivet, a well-known voice teacher and teacher of world-class soprano, Natalie Dessey. In Italy, he gave a presentation of an American Broadway Musical. As a result, he will direct an orchestra of L'Accademia Superiore di Musica "Lorenzo Perosi" in Biella, Italy in the summer of 2002. He will take four American singers with him for "An Evening of American Broadway Musical" in Italy.

Mark-Daniel Schmid, Music History and Piano, received a Fellowship Grant from the DAAD (German Academic Exchange) over the summer to bring the renowned piano pedagogue Christine Fischer from the Music Conservatory in Stuttgart, Germany, to the U.S. for the month of September. She will give two master classes in piano at MU, one of which is specifically geared for piano teachers in the Twin Tiers. During her residence in Mansfield, Professor Fischer will also conduct classes at Penn State University, Susquehanna University and Lycoming College.

Dr. Schmid has also been busy writing for and editing the Strauss Companion, which is scheduled for publication in spring of 2002. However, the best part of the summer was spent enjoying time in the garden with his one-year-old daughter, Tatiana. Anyone wanting to see a picture of her perfect posture at the piano is welcome to stop by his office (BC 207).

Dr. Kenneth Sarch, Professor of Violin and Viola and conductor of the MU Symphony Orchestra, will travel to Cuba in December as an invited participant in a People To People Delegation of Stringed Instrument Music Educators. The invitation to join string teachers from around the U.S. to form a delegation to meet with Cuban musicians and string teachers came from the president of the American String Teachers Association (ASTA). The 10-day trip will include meetings with cultural ministers, music programs in public schools and conservatories, conductors and players of the Cuban Youth Orchestra, string teachers and students. It will include tours of Havana, tobacco and sugar cane fields and the city of Cienfuegos. Dr. Sarch will present several clinics on innovations of string teaching in the West. Cuban contact with music teaching in the U.S. has been absent for about 40 years. Dr. Sarch has

received a Mansfield University Faculty Development grant towards the expenses of the trip.

Jean-Anne Teal: Spring semester 2001 sabbatical marked for me the completion of 10 years of teaching at Mansfield. To my delight it also marked my first sabbatical leave. The study project I chose took me to New York City, where I focused on the teaching of vocal scientist and bel canto expert Cornelius Reid. Each day from noon until about 6 p.m., I observed Mr. Reid teaching at his West End Avenue studio, and two or three times each week I also had lessons with him. It was the first time since college that I had participated in such intensive vocal study, and it felt great being a student again! Not only was I able to follow my own weekly progress, I also observed consecutively all of Mr. Reid's students—a wonderful opportunity for learning more about the bel canto method.

Another part of my sabbatical study was to research the songs of Romantic women composers. Each week I spent hours playing and singing through songs by Louise Reichardt, Fanny Mendelssohn-Hensel, Josephine Lang, Clara Schumann, Cecile Chaminade, Pauline Viardot, and others. Finally I culled out five groups of my favorites to form a recital program to be given back at Mansfield. Many of my other 'discoveries' I have brought back to share with my voice students here.

Then in May I followed Mr. Reid to Germany for his annual master classes in Frankfurt, Duisburg and Essen. This was an even greater learning experience because Mr. Reid informed the audience (made up of voice teachers and students), step by step, exactly why he had selected each exercise for each student. It was exciting to observe such a master at work and to hear the changes he brought about in the young voices. Now I look forward to bringing back the knowledge I have learned to my students at Mansfield.
