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Message from the Chair

Greetings alumni and friends! When I last wrote to you I was serving as interim chair of the music department. I shared some of the many new and exciting things happening in Butler Music Center and around our campus. My colleagues have asked me to serve as the regular chairman of the department for the next few years. We are looking forward to an exciting year of teaching and music making in our efforts to continue providing something for which you and the university may be proud. We will be settling into a revised curriculum following last year's mandate by the state to reduce the number of credit hours per program. You can be assured that the quality of our degree programs remains high.

We are also developing new initiatives for raising music scholarships and improving our exposure through improved PR. Our recruitment efforts have been more successful in recent years and we are retaining a larger percentage of our music students through their full four-year programs. This will also be the first year for our revised Master's program.

The department continues to be supported by the university and is now allowed to have more graduate assistants. In the fall we will welcome five new graduate assistants and two full time graduate students. Three are pursuing the conducting emphasis (two instrumental and one choral) and four will emphasize music education. We are excited to have these individuals to help the teachers in the department.

We have a new secretary in our department. Mrs. Melanie Seymour has been running the music office since February and we are very impressed with her kind professionalism. If you ever need any information or need to get in touch with a faculty member, she is the person to call!

Finally, you should be aware that budget cuts are beginning to hit us pretty hard and financial operation of the department is becoming more difficult. As you know, music departments tend to be expensive and we are doing our best to further economize. For example, the *Cadenza* will be primarily available online. We will continue to send you a printed copy if you do not have access to a computer and you are always welcome to visit us at our website. The phone number for the department is still (570) 662-4710. The *Cadenza* reaches 2940 alumni and friends. We are extremely grateful for any and all donations received from our alumni and friends. But are you aware of what such a donation from each one of you could do for the department? Our operating budget would be vastly enhanced and we could attract more students through better scholarship offers. We could make important equipment purchases and bring in more guest artists. Upcoming Choral Activity Highlights

The choral program for 2003-2004 will feature a wide array of choral styles, offering a wonderful diet for the students and community of Mansfield University. Our annual Fall Choral Collage on Saturday, October 25, at 8 p.m., will present a world premiere of a work just written for the MU Concert Choir by Fred Thayer of Williamsport, PA. Fred took my favorite text, a Sanskrit prayer, and crafted a lovely composition entitled, "Look to this Day." Other works to be performed will highlight instrumental accompaniment including tuba, timpani, and French horn soloists.

The Third Annual Young Men's Choral Festival, sponsored by our student ACDA chapter, will be held on Thursday, November 6, and will bring to the campus "Cantus," a men's ensemble that is rising to international fame. They originated at St. Olaf College and model themselves after Chanticleer. Eileen Hower will be the guest conductor for the more than 100 young male singers who regularly participate.

The theme for this year's pair of holiday choral concerts on December 5 & 6 is "Glorious Glorias." Music for men's, women's, and mixed choirs from the Renaissance to the Contemporary that uses the text "Glory to God in the Highest" will be featured. Magnificent settings by Josquin, Bach, and Rutter will be included along with Jazz and Gospel selections.

Kimber Billow, one of our outstanding music alums, will be the guest clinician for the Annual School Choral Festival on March 23 & 24. The theme we have chosen this year will be the music of Stephen Sondheim. Each school that comes for the workshop will be asked to sing at least one selection, whose music or lyrics were written by this American icon.

The Concert Choir tour will take the group to Rochester, NY, from March 30 through April 1st. Watch for a performance if you live in the area!

On April 17 & 18, the Festival Chorus and Concert Choir will present one of the greatest choral works of all time, the thrilling Mass in B Minor by Johann Sebastian Bach, with full orchestra and professional alumni soloists. For the second performance, we will travel to the beautiful Corning Museum of Glass Auditorium as we have done for the past two years.

To bring the year to a close, I have the honor of conducting the Pennsylvania All-State Chorus at the PMEA Conference in Erie on April 24. The program I have chosen is called, "Connections to the Continents," and features works from around the world. It will be a great thrill to conduct more than 250 of the finest high school singers in the state!

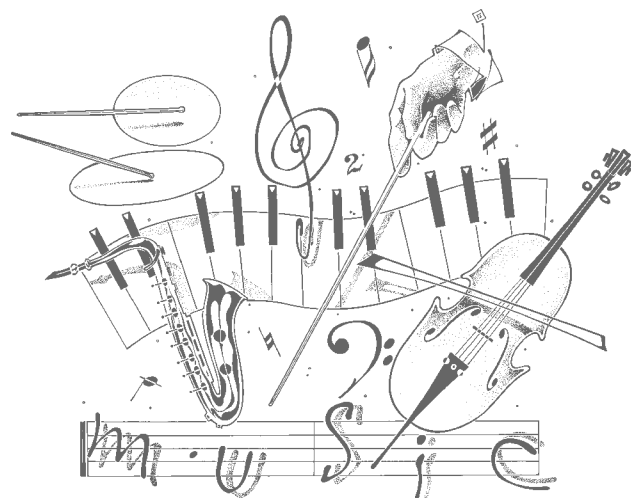
Do hope to see many of you in the audience at these choral events during the year.

MU Band News

The Mansfield University "Pride of Pennsylvania!" Marching Band performs at all home football games and other functions. The band will travel to Dauphin, PA on September 20 where it will be featured at a high school marching festival. Then it will go to Allentown, PA where it will perform at the annual Collegiate Marching Band Festival on the 21st. The big trip of the season will be to the Catsauqua Sesquicentennial Celebration on October 4 where it will perform its field show, participate in the parade and play with 10 other bands in a massed performance of patriotic music. Dr. Adam Brennan, our director of bands, has been chosen to create the musical arrangements, rehearse the assembled bands and conduct them at the big closing ceremony.

The marching band enrollment continues to grow, as does the quality of this performing ensemble. With an emphasis on quality music and excellence in performance, the band is recognized as a premiere collegiate marching unit in the state. Membership for the 2003 season is more than 170 members. About 30 student staff assist Dr. Brennan and new Assistant Director of Bands Nathan Rinnert. In addition, two graduate students are assigned to the band as part of their duties.

Plans for the annual Concert Wind Ensemble and Jazz Band tour have not been finalized yet. The wind ensemble plans an exciting year with two concerts in the fall and two in the spring. In late May the bands will host their third annual Honor's Band Concert featuring a weekend of activities for three of the finest bands in the state of PA. As always, the bands will host their annual Jazz Festival and Band and Orchestra Festival during the spring semester. A new band CD should be released in the fall featuring the wind ensemble, jazz band and marching bands. Sera Smolen (cello), Nancy Boston (piano) and Joe Murphy (saxophone) will perform music by Libby Larsen, Brenton Broadstock, Michael Kallstrom and David Liebman at Dickenson College this coming September 5, then at the University of Louisville on September 25 and the University of Western Kentucky on September 26.

Matt Slotkin (guitar) and Joe Murphy performed at Chatauqua Institute on August 13 and they will perform again together at the University of North Carolina, Wilmington on November 19 with a reprise at East Carolina University on November 20.

Their concert includes music by Kechley, Piazzolla, Beaser, Corea and Towner.

He developed three programs, which he performed at 24 saxophone concerts in five states plus three recitals in France. Joe also researched and created a database of saxophone web sites (1100 items), saxophone music (1000 items), recordings (1200), reference bibliography (900), and World Saxophone Congress historical material (3000 items). He also did other research, some writing and he has prepared Powerpoint presentations having to do with the process by which students learn music. His full-time teaching assignment will include saxophone instruction, supervision of student teachers and a course on computer music.

Mr. Bryttan has served as conductor and violinist on the music faculties at Memphis State, Kansas State and Notre Dame Universities and most recently, Vassar College. He's invited to conduct operatic and symphonic performances at Rutgers University and the Manhattan School of Music. He is also a member on the faculty at the Pre College Division at the Manhattan School of Music. He continues to enjoy working with young musicians, most recently as conductor for four seasons with the New Jersey Youth Symphony. His latest CD recording, Händel's "Acis and Galatea" is on the Schwann Koch label.
